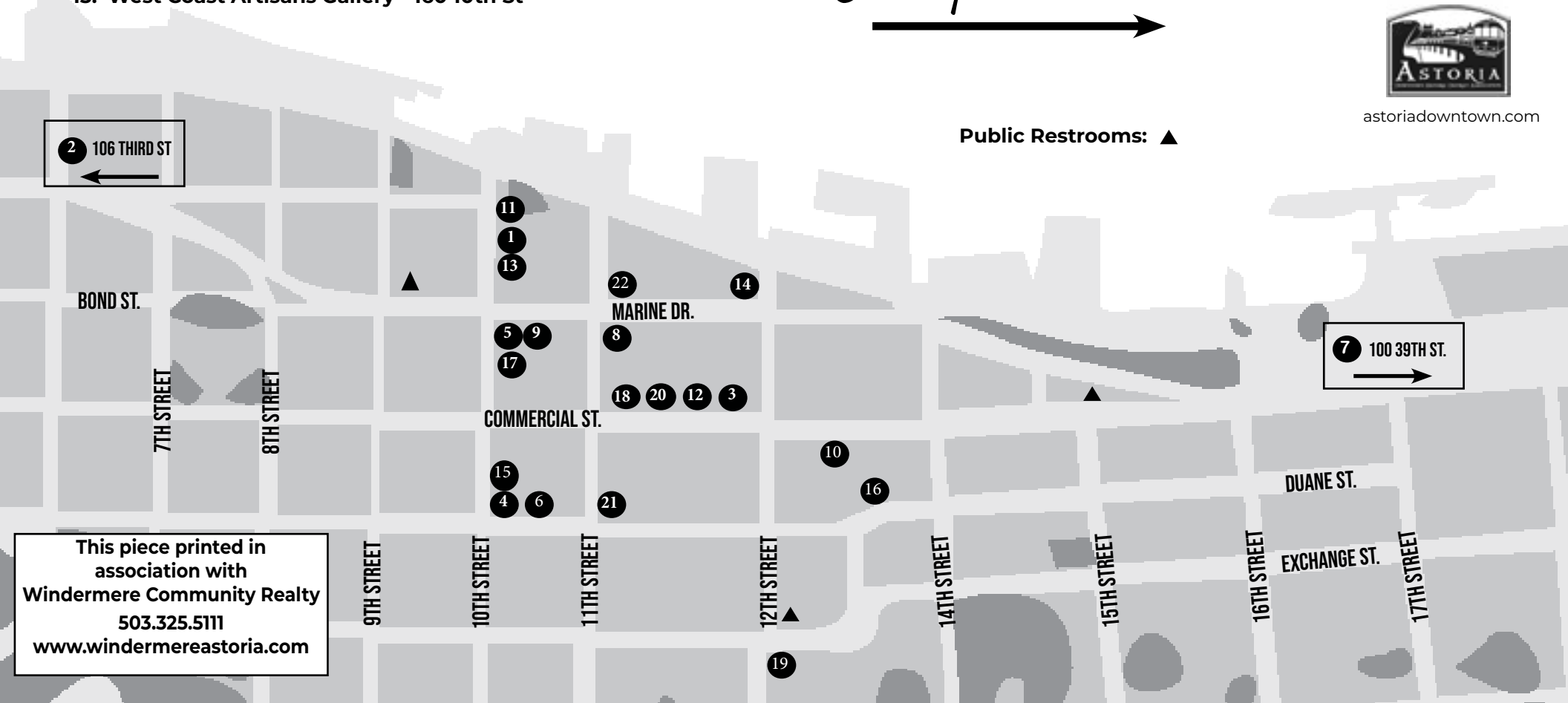

1. Angi D Wildt Gallery Celebrating Three Years in Astoria!

The gallery moved to Astoria from Seaside in September 2020. The first thought was to do a popup for ArtWalk until walking into this great space. There are little nooks and a loft filled with art from 25 artists working in various mediums and expressions. A few vintage pieces for sale from private collectors are also available.

2. Astoria Art Loft Potpourri

The Art Loft welcomes guest watercolorist Jacelyn Pearson and her "Old Vehicle" series along with our Resident Artists' September exhibit.

3. ARTstoria Lush Moments

There are simple moments that capture the essence of each season. While in the heart of downtown, come upstairs and experience these for yourself. You'll find landscapes, wildlife, flowers...on canvas, in prints, on journals and cards, and more. Open 1-7.

4. Astoria Visual Arts Bearing Witness

"Bearing Witness" is a series of 19 oil paintings structured after the Stations of the Cross. In the 62 days from her diagnosis with a brain tumor in April 2022, to her departure, Charis Barasch, a devout Christian, literally manifested her theology. "Bearing Witness" expresses in words and text what was revealed to her husband, Philip, in her final weeks. This exhibition embodies a final wish and an act of unconditional love between husband and wife.

5. Brumfield Gallery Florilegium

Shannon Amidon's exhibition, Florilegium, is inspired by the captivating beauty found within the plant and floral realm on the 4.5 acre landscape she inhabits in rural, Troutdale, Or.

6. Cambium Gallery Fractal Visionaries

Portland artists Latoya Lovely and Alex Valle don't know each other however when Leah Kohlenberg was asked to curate this show, they both came to her mind simultaneously. They see the world similarly, in tiny, delicate, disparate pieces, with everything made up of teeny, tiny little parts. Show opens 5-8 pm with curator present to discuss the work.

7. Gallery on Pier 39 Oregon in My Heart

Jen Hoff is a mixed-media artist inspired by both people and nature. Nature became especially influential in her art after moving to the Oregon coast! You can see her works during her show 'Oregon in My Heart' at the GALLERY On Pier 39.

8. Imogen Gallery Paracosm and In the Weeds

Within the series "Paracosm" Darren Orange continues his bold and energetic style, employing movement synonymous with dance and filling our space with powerful color and energy. His process always intertwined with finished composition demands the viewer to take note and participate in the echo left behind from its creation.

Working primarily in watercolor, Justin L'Amie brings a new series of delightful paintings portraying flora and fauna in whimsical and spontaneous composition. L'Amie is originally from Astoria and began his art studies at Clatsop Community College before acquiring his BFA at Cornish College of Art.

9. LightBox Photographic Gallery Luminosity: An Elemental Conversation

Julie Moore makes prints from both her Holga and her iPhone using the polymer-photography process. She says, "My images share the way I see the world, its soft tenderness and extravagant beauty, its agonizing loss and exquisite aging. There is precious beauty in the unseen, parts of everyday life that can go missing because they are not prominent yet have much to teach us."

10. Made in Astoria Neon Shadows

Astorian Morrison Pierce shares his latest work: an observation into the past that could predict the future. A contemporary painter who shows his work internationally, Pierce uses current and personal events to fuel his creative process, often blending the macabre or dystopian scene with absurdity and humor. "Neon Shadows" continues in this vein, offering an artist's reflection of today's world, giving his all for the sake of art.

11. Paul Polson Studio Gallery The Paintings of Lisa Ackerman

Paul Polson Gallery welcomes guest artist Lisa Ackerman, who will show her oil paintings and prints of sea, river, and landscapes featuring surreal and Zen moments, including appearances by legendary and influential beings.

12. RiverSea Gallery Fairy Tale and Welcome to the Hotel California

'Fairy Tale' is a series of invented portraits and an invitation to enter the enchanted world of Jane Terzis. Many of us had imaginary friends in our childhood, but Terzis had a private club. She began painting people when she was four years old and never stopped. Her

paintings of fictional children depict characters brimming with life and so full of distinctive personality that we are compelled to believe we've met them somewhere. Terzis often adds context with landscape elements and background figures to give situational drama to the imaginary lives of her subjects.

Jill McVarish turns back the clock to the 1970s in 'Welcome to the Hotel California'. With her signature twist of humor, she focuses on the darker aspects of lifestyles in this storied decade and teases with playful musical references. Each painting draws its title and theme from a popular song. Artist Reception 5 to 8 pm music by John Orr and Clarence Robinson.

13. West Coast Artisans Painted then Quilted

Local artist Ronni Harris joins our artists with her quilted paintings of iconic Astoria landscapes. Her work is hand-painted, quilted, then embellished to bring out the details of the scene she's recreating. Open 11 to 7.

14. Astoria Brewing Company Tap Room Love, Passion and Fear

Rigel Ross has lived in the PNW for thirty years. This show explores various mediums, from ink drawing, painting and block printing, to collage and origami- often coming together as mixed media. Rigel's subject matter is sometimes whimsical, but more often highlights the joys of love or the grip fear holds over us. Prints and originals will be available.

15. Astoria Studio Collective Petri Dish

Through a scientific-like method, both Rebecca Fries' and Deanna Antony's work hold an organic quality, utilizing process, selective elements, and the vernacular of color to communicate dazzling abstracted ideas in 2D and 3D! Rebecca is showing works on paper and Deanna is showing soft sculptures. Both artists live and work in Astoria. Come by and enjoy a whimsical and captivating space of color, pattern, texture, and form.

16. Bridge and Tunnel Bottle Shop

I came, I saw, I captured light, shadow and emotions. A citizen of Astoria, a child of the world, Rob Burns of Big Eye Imagination brings his work to adorn your walls.

17. Brut Wine Bar The Photography of Tracy Phinney

Local photographer Tracy Phinney loves photographing the world in its natural beauty. This collection focuses on macro photography with a few other creative touches to the collection.

18. Forsythea Great Local Art

We continue our exhibition of three great local artists. Featuring Brianne Janes' scenes of Oregon in oil on canvas, Seasons Kaz Sparks' watercolors and ink drawing prints, and Forsythea's founder, Patricia Fagerland's botanicals set against familiar landscapes, whimsy and still life in vibrant colors, in acrylic and/or acrylic/mixed media.

19. Gathered Bakeshop Summer Art Camp

Art Room and Astoria Visual Arts partnered for the second year to provide summer art camps for 180 area youth ages 5-12. The three camps were held at Fort Steven's State Park. Week 1, campers used various printmaking processes to create one of a kind, two-dimensional art. Week 2 focused on repurposed materials, beginning with a beach cleanup. Campers used found materials to make collaborative and individual projects. Week 3 campers created three-dimensional pieces using techniques like assembling, molding, and casting.

20. Old Things and Objects Vintage PNW Maritime

Vintage Northwest maritime art – Original paintings and signed prints – Vintage and Old Pawn Native American jewelry – Local Studio Pottery – Vintage clothing – Military – Books – Records – Children's books, records, and toys – Old, Curious, Weird and Wonderful Things!

21. Umpqua Bank Earth and Fire Ceramics

Peg Johnson has been working with clay for about 40 years. When she saw a woman in Greenwich Village throwing a pot on a kick wheel, she knew she was going to be a potter. Two years later she took a class and now especially loves the challenge of the Raku process. Raku is a simple but dramatic process. Pieces are decorated with stains, glazes, textural treatments, etc. The pots are put in an outdoor kiln with temps reaching 1800 degrees, then removed immediately. The red-hot pieces are nearly translucent as they are plunged into a container of combustible material. There they burst into flame starting the reduction process. The lid is placed on the container, causing a loss of oxygen. This turns the clay black and affects the glazes in exciting and unpredictable ways. Results are one of a kind.

22. Xanadu Astoria Apathetic Visitors

Xanadu Astoria hosts our inaugural art show featuring Jaz North Coast! Jaz is a local artist and muralist. Inspired by the people of Astoria and the nature that surrounds our unique town, this series is inspired by this summer's tourists. She calls it "Apathetic Visitors".
